REQUEST FOR PROPOSALS

Dear Community Provider,

The New Jersey Department of Children and Families (NJDCF) Children's System of Care (CSOC) and CGS Family Partnership, Inc. (CGS) announces the availability of Community Resource Development Funds (CRDF). The available CRDF of \$67,697.00 (less may be applied for) is contingent on the sufficiency and availability of CSOC funding. Final decisions regarding grant awards will be at the discretion of CSOC.

The NJDCF is a statewide family and child-serving agency, working to assist NJ families in becoming or remaining safe, healthy, and connected. CGS provides care management services to children and youth experiencing emotional, behavioral, developmental, intellectual, and substance use needs, and their families in Cumberland, Gloucester, and Salem Counties.

This letter serves as a "Request for Proposals" (RFP) to develop and/or increase the availability of community-based resources in Cumberland, Gloucester, and Salem Counties to youth experiencing emotional, behavioral, developmental, intellectual, and/or substance use needs, and their families.

The CRDF is designated solely for the purpose of developing or expanding existing sustainable community resources or services based on the unmet needs of youth and families in Cumberland, Gloucester, or Salem Counties. CRD Funds cannot be used to purchase services. CGS will have access to limited CRD Funds designated for one time use by community organizations to promote and develop new, additional, and/or unique resources to address an unmet or under-addressed need(s) in Cumberland, Gloucester, and Salem Counties. NJDCF and CGS expect the initial program to serve children and or families for one year with CRDF and to continue the program with sustainable funding sources after the initial year.

Gloucester, Cumberland and Salem County Community Resource Funds Background and Rationale Fiscal Year 2027

The proximity of Cumberland, Gloucester, and Salem makes it easy for these communities to share social determinants and Adverse Childhood Experiences. In recent years there have been multiple high-profile youth involved, violent events including murders and severe injuries which affected all three counties. Initiatives to address the violence and mitigate the outcomes have shown some success in the region. However, youth violence is still a public health issue. For FY 2027 CGS seeks to impact the local violence prevention effort by adding to the prevention service lines in Cumberland, Gloucester, and Salem Counties. FY2027 CGS RFP Description

The purpose of this Request for Proposals (RFP) is to fund a proposal (s) from a local organization (s) to expand or create an **Anti-violence**, **Conflict Resolution**, **and Mental Health After School Program**. Programming must focus on family engagement, preventing violence, and eliminating current participation in violence. This program should target youth in middle school ages 11 to 14 and youth in alterative school of similar ages.

The maximum total of Community Resource Development Funds available to fund this program is \$67,697.00. Proposals which provide this service in all three counties (Cumberland, Gloucester, and Salem) or address barriers to access (i.e., transportation) will receive increased consideration.

Additionally, the awarded program will provide at least one nutritious meal during participation and ideally should address barriers which could cause some youth not to participate in the service. As with all CSOC and CGS sponsored programming, linking the youth to additional wraparound services, when needed, should be a part of the program design.

The awarded program (s) will provide anti violence programming that increases the coping capacity needed to manage the social variables leading to violent activity by youth in Cumberland, Gloucester, and Salem Counties. Youth who are eligible for services through CSOC, DCPP and other child serving systems will be eligible to participate. However, **all youth**, including youth with intellectual and/or developmental disabilities, must be included in the program design under the No Eject/ No Reject policy adopted by CSOC and CGS.

Collaborative and innovative applications that maximize the impact of these limited funds are encouraged as well as projects that include family participation. This funding solicitation is twofold: first to develop and/or increase the availability of resources to youth and their families; and secondly to increase positive outcomes for youth experiencing violence firsthand or by exposure to violence in their neighborhoods.

Attendance is optional but encouraged.

Proposals Submission Deadline: 5:00 PM, December 16, 2025

All proposals shall include the information listed in *Appendix I – Community Resource Development Funds Application* and will be evaluated based on the *Appendix II - CRD Funds Proposal Proposals Rating Scale*.

CRD will also accept proposals through the United States Postal Service, USPS and same day delivery services, before the 5 PM deadline. If sent by USPS, respondents are encouraged to leave a text message (856. 341.6453) or email at CRD@cgscmo.org to confirm your proposal was received. Incomplete proposals or proposals received after this deadline will not be considered.

CSOC Completes Funding Recommendation(s) to CSOC: March 27, 2026

CRD will submit recommended proposal(s) to DCF's Children's System of Care for review and approval.

CSOC Funding Approval Date: May 15, 2026

CSOC will notify CRD of the funding approval decision.

CGS Award Notification: May 15, 2026

CGS Community Resource Department will notify the awarded entity by phone and official email.

Disbursement of CRD Funding and Program Implementation: July 1, 2026

It is the expectation of NJDCF and CGS that the chosen entity initiate the proposed programming by July 1, 2026. CGS will disburse funds to the awarded entity once funds are made available by NJDCF. FY27 CRD Funds are designated to help support the chosen program in accordance with the proposed budget for 12 months. After the initial year, the awarded entity is expected to continue the program with sustainable funding.

Program Reporting

Three (3) reports in total will be due. One (1) start up launch report 30 days after implementation. One (1) 2026-year end Progress Report. And finally, one (1) 2027 fiscal year end outcome report.

CARI Checks

Any agencies funded by DCF, are subject to the Child Abuse Record Information (CARI) background check requirement mandated by N.J.S.A. 9:6-8.10f. As of October 1, 2019, the CARI Online Application System is available to DCF affiliated agencies to create an account and submit CARI applications.

A requirement that any awarded agency must obtain CARI checks on all staff that will provide direct service to youth under the age of 18 years old is now in effect. The awarded agency must provide a CARI check certification form to the CMO stating all checks have been completed and all staff that will participate have met the CARI requirements.

Steps to register for CARI checks

When CMO identifies an agency as the potential CRD awardee they will direct the awardee to follow the process as listed below.

- 1. The applicant will register as a business with the State of NJ and receive an Employee Identification number (75.00 fee) and a tax ID number. The step by step process is provided at https://business.nj.gov/ where you can both register your business to receive your EIN and receive a tax ID number.
- 2. Once these numbers have been assigned, please visit https://www.njstart.gov/bso/ to create a record, and acquire a vendor identification number. (150.00 fee)
- 3. The final step will be to follow the instructions and register with the CARI unit and submit for CARI checks (see below).
- 4. CARI will notify the agency if their staff are clear or if they need to be terminated. CARI will require a signed verification that the unapproved staff are no longer with the organization.
- 5. Once the agency has completed this process, they will submit the CARI Certification form to the CMO, as it will need to be included in the submission of the Proposal and recommendation to CSOC.
- (Language from the certification is included below*)
- 6. Fees associated with the registration process for CARI may be included in the agencies budget proposal.

Accessing the CARI System

To access the CARI Online Application System, each agency will need to set up a facility account by visiting https://www.njportal.com/dcf/cari. Agencies will identify an administrator to create and maintain the facility account, and who will be responsible for submitting and receiving CARI applications and results. The abovementioned website will prompt the identified administrator to "Create a New CARI Account" and will provide

tutorials for setting up the facility account. When creating an account, select "Department of Children and Families – Community Partners" from the drop-down selection of Program/Application Types.

To set up a CARI account, the agency administrator will then need to provide their agency's Vendor Identification Number, which is the letter "V" followed by 8 digits. Next, the administrator will be prompted to create a My New Jersey account username. This will be the username and password used by the account administrator to log in to the Online Application System moving forward.

The Online Application System will allow the account administrator to invite agency staff to complete an online CARI form and to check the status of submitted applications. Employees will be able to complete the electronic CARI application through an emailed link, or on-site at the agency.

The employee can complete the application using a personal computer or smart phone; however, the email invitation link will expire after two weeks. All completed CARI checks are returned through the Online Application System, and the results will be emailed directly to the facility account administrator.

Time frames and next Steps

Once submitted CARI checks are expected to be completed within a week barring no complications.

The following is the language from the CARI Check Attestation form which the awarded agency will submit to the CGS:

By my signature below, I attest I am authorized to sign this document on behalf of my organization. I agree that as of this date below my organization has met all the requirements of the CARI check process. Should my agency acquire any additional staff during this CRD award period, that staff will be required to submit CARI checks and be approved by the CARI unit.

If any staff within this organization are found to be ineligible for employment under this grant by the CARI Unit, they will not be allowed to work within the programming funded by the CMO CRD grant.

Organizational Overview and History - <u>10 points</u>

• Is the agency well equipped and experienced providing services to youth and families who are experiencing emotional, behavioral, developmental, intellectual, and substance use needs? Is the agency duly prepared to operate the service or program element for which funding is applied?

Needs Statement - 20 points

- Are the needs of the community which this proposal aims to address well-articulated and based on reliable sources of information and data?
- Do the needs cited in the proposal coincide with the criteria for usage of funds targeted to agencies serving youth and families experiencing serious emotional, behavioral, developmental, intellectual, and substance use needs?
- Does the need statement address the development of new services where service expansion is necessary because services cannot be secured through an existing agency; or is service availability non-existent?
- Do the needs cited in the proposal coincide with service need priorities identified by local planning bodies?
- Demonstrate an understanding of referral needs for all NJ Children's System of Care Partners.
- General and specific knowledge of cultural considerations necessary to be successful in Cumberland, Gloucester, and Salem Counties.

Impact & Accessibility (Reducing barriers to access) 15 points

- What is the potential reach or impact of the proposed services/programming (number of youth, diversity or needs of youth served, impact across Cumberland, Gloucester, Salem)?
- Are transportation and accessibility needs addressed (location, any assistance with transportation, easily accessible for people with different mobility needs, multiple locations, etc.)?
- How are participants recruited to participate? Does recruitment promote a broader reach of participation for youth eligible for CSOC & DCPP services?

Description of Service (s) to be funded - 20 points

- Is the target population and number youth and families to be served identified?
- Describe program components and how they differ from existing programs. Is the description of the service(s) or program element well-articulated, reasonably attainable and based on best practice models?
- What are the staffing considerations? Does the proposal articulate the staffing structure of the proposed program or service?
- Is value to the community and inclusivity articulated?
- What is the implementation plan and schedule? Is there a clear plan on how to implement and start/expand the program? Include effective period or term of the service or activity.
- Embodiment of CSOC values including No eject No reject policy and an agreement to serve Medicaideligible youth and their families, all eligible youth in Cumberland, Gloucester and Salem Counties.

Program Evaluation Methods and Outcome Indicators - 10 points

- Are the anticipated outcomes quantifiable deliverables, level of service, and/or outcomes realistic, measurable, observable, and verifiable?
- Are the outcomes relevant to the need(s) that the program aims to address and the services to be provided?
- Does the project demonstrate sustainability after initial funding?

- Does the proposal describe how services will be evaluated, including how case activity will be monitored, and accountability will be assured?
- Is there an adequate description of administration and programmatic and fiscal oversight of the program or service?
- Does the proposal acknowledge the obligation to provide reports of activity to CGS Family Partnership, Inc.?
- Evaluation of practice or program adherence/fidelity/effectiveness and participation in ongoing outcomes research, if applicable, to the practice or program proposed.
- Documentation of quality assurance effort and outcomes monitoring plan
- Affirmation of required periodic fiscal and or program reports to demonstrate compliance with the bid requirements.

Program Budget - *15 points*

- Is a complete and clear budget included?
- Is the budget reasonable based on established rates for services and the amount of funds available?
- Does the budget account for all staff, supplies, and services included in the description of service(s) or program element to be funded (either through fund request or match by other funding source)?
- Are other funding sources cited viable to be applied as a match to community resource development funds?
- Is the service for which funding is requested clearly a new service/program element or expansion of services/programs not otherwise funded by another source?

Sustainability 10 points

• Does the proposal demonstrate a clear path to sustainability for the expanded or new service or program?
